A letter from our CEO-

This year was so exciting as we celebrated our 50th anniversary as an organization! We actually have probably been around a couple of years longer than that. History has it that we were started by a group of seven churches in McLean to help young people who had run away, find their way home. The organization, called Juvenile Assistance of McLean or JAM, began a couple of years before we were officially incorporated in May of 1972.



I sometimes get asked if I was the founding Executive at Second Story. No, I am not, but I have served the organization for more than half of those 50 years. It's very gratifying to see how during that time, we've been able to grow to serve young people and their families by creating programs that address new, or newly identified, challenges they face.

And, of course, we couldn't have done it without all your support along the way. Our community, supporters, staff, and volunteers make it possible for us to be there for young people at critical moments in their lives.

Your financial support helped us meet our goal of raising \$4,000,000 over a three-year period so that we could keep all our doors open and not turn a single youth away. Your donations of food and school supplies meant that we could provide a whopping 12,309 food distributions as well as baskets of food at Thanksgiving and backpacks filled with school supplies for youth who needed them when the school year began. Hundreds of children and youth in our community received presents over the holiday season because you so generously answered the call to add them to your own holiday shopping list.

Because we know you care about the youth in our community, we can look towards an even brighter future. Our newly completed five-year strategic plan includes our commitment to focus on youth education and employment. Our goal is to move young people in our programs beyond paycheck-to-paycheck employment and into training and jobs that promote a career so they can truly grow and thrive. To support this work, we now have an education and employment fund which includes the \$25,000 Irene Pierce Scholarship, used to help young people in our programs with tuition and other education expenses.

Children and youth are constantly changing and growing. Over the past 50 years, Second Story has grown and changed also to keep up with the evolving needs of young people. Inevitably, this next year, and the countless years after that, change will continue to happen. With your help and support, Second Story will continue to be there to help young people with whatever new challenges they face.

Our Programs

All services are provided at no cost to youth or their families.



Second Story for Teens in Crisis

Second Story for Teens in Crisis is a completely voluntary program for young people 13 to 17 years old. In addition to safe shelter, food, and clothing, each teen receives intensive individual, group, and family counseling and help keeping up with their education.

Second Story for Homeless Youth

Second Story for Homeless Youth helps high school students and youth experiencing homelessness with housing and case management using a combination of host homes, rental assistance, and rapid re-housing.

Second Story for Young Mothers

Second Story for Young Mothers provides housing and counseling to young mothers experiencing homelessness so they can learn to support themselves and their children. They focus on parenting skills, education, job readiness, and self-sufficiency.

Second Story in the Community

Second Story serves the communities of Culmore, Annandale, and Springfield through Family Resource Centers, Safe Youth Projects, and a Teen Center. Second Story also proudly serves as the lead agency for the Bailey's Crossroads area as part of Opportunity Neighborhoods (ON). Through ON, we work alongside residents, government, public schools, and other partners to elevate community voices, provide training, and deliver resources to the community.

Mia's Story



"Mia's" high school social worker referred her to Second Story during her senior year because her mother suffered from serious mental health issues and was unable to care for her daughter. Second Story stepped in to help Mia find a safe place to live and learn important life skills so she could stay in school while learning how to live independently.

First, Mia worked with her case worker to find a room to rent. She met regularly with her case manager and attended group sessions to learn skills, including budgeting, goal setting, personal hygiene, self-care, and emergency preparedness. While Mia balanced school and work, her case worker would deliver volunteer-donated snack packs, toiletries, cleaning supplies, towels, linens, and special meals and gifts during the holidays. She also referred Mia to local food resources. Mia graduated from Second Story's program, as well as high school, and entered community college to study pediatric nursing.

During her third year in college, Mia's case manager reached out to suggest she apply

for a new scholarship. Established by Irene Pierce who named Second Story as a beneficiary of her estate, the scholarship provides assistance with rent, tuition, and books as long as recipients maintain decent grades. In July of 2022, Mia was accepted into the inaugural class of the Irene Pierce Scholarship program. Mia immediately contacted her case manager to share her excitement through happy tears. She said she felt great relief because the scholarship took some financial stress off of her shoulders. Mia continues to work hard as she moves closer to achieving her goals.




